This NEXT guide is designed to help you interact with the Bible as you take your next steps in knowing God.

Each chapter includes three sections. Each section includes passages from the Bible for you to read and mark as indicated. This is to help you develop your skills in observing what the Bible says. As you read each passage, ask yourself questions such as:

- "What is happening?"
- "Who is speaking?"
- "Why is this being said?"

To understand the greater context of the Scripture, consider looking up the passages in your Bible to read the surrounding verses.

Each section also includes questions for reflection and discussion. These questions are designed to draw out your thoughts and perspectives on the topics we will explore. These questions will also challenge you to personalize what you're reading by considering how it applies to your life.

If possible, please read each chapter and answer the questions before your group meets. This will aid in your group's discussion and will help you internalize new perspectives.

CHAPTER ONE



Know Me

And we know that the Son of God has come, and he has given us understanding so that we can know the true God... 1 John 5:20

God knows us, and he wants us to know him! That profound thought will be the focus of our journey through NEXT, and the Bible will be our guide.

Think for a moment of your greatest hero or the person you admire most. Now, imagine this unlikely scenario:

You're a reporter, and you've been granted a personal interview with your greatest hero. (If your hero is from the past, you can travel back in a time machine for your interview.) This interview is the opportunity of a lifetime!

When the day of your interview comes, you wonder if you will be meeting briefly in an office or a conference room. Perhaps you will be part of a large group of reporters, where you'll have to try to ask your questions over a cacophony of voices in the room.

Suppose instead that on the day of the interview, you are welcomed into your hero's home. When you walk up to the door of the residence, you discover your hero smiling warmly as they greet you. Your hero ushers you in and the two of you sit by the fire, enjoying relaxed conversation with no worry of a schedule to keep.

At first, your mind is racing as you wonder if there's been some mistake. But then, your hero interrupts your thoughts to tell you that they have waited a long time to meet with you in person. As you chat about your life, you become so lost in conversation that you almost forget this is your hero. Not only do they answer your questions, but they invite you to come back again to talk more. Their door is open to you anytime!

As unlikely as this scenario is, let's take some time to consider something even more incredible: The creator of the universe has invited you to know him personally—more and more each day! After all, he already knows you. He knows everything about you, including things even you might not find interesting, like the number of hairs on your head (Luke 12:7). He knows when you sit down and when you stand up (Psalm 139:2). He even knows the thoughts and intents of your heart (Hebrews 4:12).

For Reflection & Discussion Who knows you best? What is it like to be known so well in that relationship?
If you had the opportunity to sit by the fire and have a cup of coffee with God, what would be your first question?



SECTION ONE:

GOD KNOWS YOU

God knows you. Have you ever pondered that thought? It may be unsettling, but consider the fact that not only does God know you, but he also loves you completely and unconditionally. That thought can bring comfort.

Pastor and author Timothy Keller (2011) describes it this way: "To be loved but not known is comforting but superficial. To be known and not loved is our greatest fear. But to be fully known and truly loved is, well, a lot like being loved by God. It is what we need more than anything. It liberates us from pretense, humbles us out of our self-righteousness, and fortifies us for any difficulty life can throw at us" (p. 101).

We are known and loved! Let's explore what God knows about us as we read the following Scripture passage.

Psalm 139:1-6

- $^{\scriptscriptstyle 1}$ O Lord, you have examined my heart and know everything about me.
- ² You know when I sit down or stand up. You know my thoughts even when I'm far away.
- ³ You see me when I travel and when I rest at home. You know everything I do.
- ⁴ You know what I am going to say even before I say it, Lord.
- 5 You go before me and follow me. You place your hand of blessing on my head.
- $^{\rm 6}$ Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too great for me to understand!

God's personal knowledge and understanding of you is quite the beginning to your relationship with him—especially when you consider that the Bible says you are known and loved by God.



SECTION TWO:

KNOWING GOD

Now, consider the value of knowing God—why he desires for us to know him and what that really means.

The book of Hosea in the Old Testament was written at a time when God's chosen people were being unfaithful to him. This book of the Bible presents the relationship between Hosea and his unfaithful wife, mirroring God and his unfaithful people. It was written to illustrate God's love for his people, even when they were being unfaithful, as well as his desire for them to know him.

Hosea 4:6

⁶ "My people are being destroyed because they don't know me..."

Understanding The Language

The Old Testament word "know," as used in 1 Chronicles 28:9, means to "have personal knowledge of Him, be acquainted with, and understand Him; appreciate, heed, and cherish Him" (*The Amplified Bible*, 1965).

The New Testament word "know," as used in Philippians 3:10, means "to progressively become more deeply and intimately acquainted with Him, perceiving and recognizing and understanding the wonders of His Person more strongly and more clearly" (*The Amplified Bible*, 1965).

For Reflection & Discussion

Based on the definitions of the word "know" that were given, how would you describe what it means for you to seek to know Christ?	

The whole story of the Bible is about God creating people to have a relationship with him. Humanity turned away from God, so he pursued us and made a way for us to come back to him. He wants us to know him and experience a loving relationship with him—one that lasts for eternity.

SECTION THREE:

TO KNOW HIM IS TO TRUST HIM

When we really get to know someone, we discover their character. The same is true with God. Knowing God's character leads us to see his trustworthiness, and seeing his trustworthiness enables us to trust him more completely.

For Reflection & Discussion

What does it mean for you to trust someone?

Notice how the Apostle Paul links knowing and trusting as he writes of his confidence in trusting the Lord.

2 Timothy 1:12

 12 ... I know the one in whom I trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard what I have entrusted to him until the day of his return.

Trust is the inseparable partner of faith. Faith is something you have, while trust is something you do. Imagine standing on a ledge when someone calls out, "Jump! I'll catch you." To have faith would be to believe they will catch you. To trust would be to jump. In essence, trust is faith put into action.

Since trust begins with getting to know someone, let's look at a few verses that explore God's character.



Deuteronomy 32:3-4

³ "I will praise the name of the LORD. Oh, praise the greatness of our God! ⁴ He is the Rock, his works are perfect, and all his ways are just. A faithful God who does no wrong, upright and just is he."
